

MEET TIM SEEBERG - GATEWAY CENTER'S NEW GENERAL MANAGER

The City of Collinsville has hired Tim Seeberg as the General Manager of the Gateway Convention Center. Tim effectively started his new job on June 7, 2021, and hit the ground running as business is picking back up.

I sat down with Tim to ask him some questions about himself and his plans for Gateway Convention Center.

Q: Tell us about yourself and where you came from?

A: "I have been in the venue management business for 20 years. I am originally from the Chicago area. I've spent the last 15 years working outside of Illinois in Eastern Tennessee, Western Colorado, and most recently in Central Arkansas."

Q: Have the venues you worked at been publicly owned venues?

A: "Yes, the venues I have worked at have been publicly owned and operated, so I definitely bring a background in managing a venue of this type."

Q: What has been one of the worst experiences you have ever had to deal with?

A: "At one of my past venues, we had preparations underway for a large banquet event – 500 people expecting to be fed for this event on a Saturday night. Well, that morning, our chef had a heart attack in the freezer, and when his staff came in that morning they found him. We were scrambling without a head chef, but we were able to partner with a neighboring hotel and get their staff to help deliver an event that night."

Q: What does "CVE" in your title designate?

A: "CVE is a designation for "Certified Venue Executive". It basically is a certification that demonstrates a few things. Number one, my commitment to the industry and my level of education within the industry. It also demonstrates that I am qualified to manage venues of any kind whether it be a convention center, arena, or a performing arts center."

Q: What was your first impressions of Gateway Center and Collinsville in general?

A: "Really impressive, venue and community. Getting around the area and checking things out, I was really impressed with what's here. There's a cool downtown area, there's a great attraction to this area for events here at the Gateway Center because we are so close to a large metro market, and the location is great. There's a lot to do here in the Southern part of Illinois and this region of the country. I was really impressed."

Q: What opportunities do you see for Gateway Center?

A: "Because we are near a larger market, there are probably some untapped business opportunities in the Downtown St. Louis area. And because we are close to St. Louis and have interstate accessibility, we think there are opportunities to grow some of our existing markets that have untapped potential, such as sports, entertainment, and competitive cheer. These are events that we have capitalized on this year but would like to do more going forward."

Q: What are some of the trends in your industry and how does Gateway Center fit within those trends?



A: "The trends I see, are that a lot of the conventions we are booking, or that we are going after, are shorter run. A three-to-four-day convention may only go for a day, day and half instead. The sporting events are becoming much larger in all markets across the country. There are many sporting organizations that are trying to put together sporting events for kids and there are more and more every year."

Q: How well equipped, technology wise, is Gateway Center?

A: "This newly remodeled wing of the Gateway Center is really well equipped for conferences and meetings that require projection and video recording capabilities. A lot of our local clients have taken advantage of the technology here to host their seminars/webinars. It is definitely important for our future."

Q: What are the biggest challenges you see for Gateway Center in the near future?

A: "First of all, related to the pandemic, I am not sure we are going to be out of it totally for a while and that will impact our industry. We may see conferences and larger events tentatively dropping off. Going into 2022, that may be challenging for us. Also as we ramp up to meet the demand of current business levels, which are really great right now, we are struggling to find staffing to fill key positions."

Q: What has been your impression of the current staff at Gateway Center?

A: "Incredible team already onboard here at Gateway. Really dedicated people that are built for this industry, which is to say 'whatever it takes to make the customer happy'. I've seen that in everybody here. We are very fortunate to have such a dedicated team and they will keep us going through the higher demand stretches of time that are in front of us."







Wastewater Plant to Undergo Bio-Solids Handling System Upgrade

The City of Collinsville is breaking ground on a new project at the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant to upgrade the facilities residual handling process. The project will convert the current inefficient process of lime stabilization and storage of the liquid bio-solids to a more efficient, sustainable, and environmentally safer process system of drying and pasteurizing the residuals. The completion of this project will provide greater flexibility and long-term cost control of residual disposal and reduce the odor produced at the facility.

Funding for this project was provided by a low interest loan from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency's Public Water Pollution Control Program (WPCLP). The WPCLP is funded by both state and federal sources. The \$6,700,000 loan has a simple interest rate of 1.11% and will be repaid over 20 years. Our classes are "Heartsaver" through the American Heart Association and are not appropriate for Health Care Providers who need "BLS Provider" Certification. BLS Classes can be provided to groups of 6 or more upon request. Heartsaver classes can be provided to larger groups upon request as well (scouts, church groups, businesses, etc).

LOCAL GREEN RECOGNITION PROGRAM

In 2021, the Cool Cities Committee started a local recognition program to spotlight the efforts of businesses and organizations who are going above and beyond to incorporate sustainable practices into their operations. The following organizations have been recognized:

OLD HERALD BREWERY & DISTILLERY

Old Herald Brewery & Distillery is being recognized for its green business practices, including the use of compostable



plant-based materials for disposable packaging, linen service to reduce paper waste, growing herbs on-site for the kitchen and bar, and donating spent grains from the brewery to local farmers to feed cattle. Additionally, Old Herald's facility utilizes 100% LED time-controlled lighting and reuses reclaimed wood and fixtures for decor throughout the establishment.



DÉJÀ VU KIDZ

Déjà vu Kidz is a not-for-profit business located on Main Street that specializes in reuse and resale of youth clothing. Their business model gives textiles a second life, preventing additional solid waste from leaving the community.



DORRIS INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL

The faculty at DIS installed a water filling station to reduce single-use plastics and encourage reusable water bottles. DIS participates in a Use-It-Again program drop box for textiles that are reused for those in need in lieu of going to the landfill. DIS has also developed an extensive recycling program for specialized materials such as cell phones, eyeglasses, hearing aids, keys, markers, highlights, and grocery bags.





Glass portions of doors/windows must be broken down and placed into small box marked "GLASS".

UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS THAT ARE NOT INCLUDED IN LARGE ITEM PICKUPS:

Basketball sets/poles, unless they are broken down into sections no larger than 3' in diameter.

Daniel Toberman is the new principal of Collinsville High School beginning with the 2021-22 school year.

"I am excited to be part of a new era at Collinsville High School," says Toberman. He succeeds Principal David Snider who retired at the end of the 2020-21 school year. Toberman has been part of the CHS staff for the past 14 years, serving 8 years as an English teacher and 5 years as assistant principal.

"Mr. Toberman has the ability to celebrate the successes of our students and staff but also make difficult decisions in the best interest of our students. He brings a wide range of experience to the position having served as a teacher and assistant principal at CHS for many years," said Collinsville CUSD 10 Superintendent Dr. Mark B. Skertich.

"He is very knowledgeable of the traditions and successful programs within the high school and able to determine areas of improvement as we move forward. I am excited to watch CHS continue to improve and flourish under the leadership of Mr. Toberman," Skertich added.

Mr. Toberman says he wants to honor the rich history at Collinsville High School: "I want the great things we have going here to continue. I want to maintain all the traditions that make us special, the things that make us Kahoks. I hope I don't make too many changes too quickly, but when I see ways to get better, I don't want to wait around either. I want all members of the school community to expect me to do what is best for our school and our students. I want everyone to hold me accountable for doing

so. I want all my decisions and those made by everyone here to be based on what is best for students."

Toberman grew up in Fairview Heights and attended Belleville East High School. He has a bachelor's degree in journalism and Education Specialist (Ed.S.) certification from SIUE, and a Master's degree from McKendree University. He moved to the Collinsville Community in 2013.

"This has become my home. No one wants this place to be better than I do. I want to work together with all stakeholders to make sure CHS is the absolute best we can make it," he says.

The 2021-22 school year presents challenges after last year's remote and hybrid learning, but Toberman and CHS staff are prepared.

"The biggest issue we have coming back this year is the lack of connection many of our students have to our school. Some never came at all, and others were limited in how much they came last year," said Toberman, "There is only one class of students currently in our school who have ever had a normal, full year as a Kahok, the seniors back when they were freshman. I want our students to love their school, and love being here.

"I am so excited about what we are going to accomplish at CHS this year and for many years. It's a great time to be a Kahok!" says Toberman.




